a year's overview

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

It seems so long ago, but we started this financial year in lockdown. We moved our sessions and groups online, and went back to weekly team Zoom meetings to connect with each other. Then we ended the year with our first in-person major event in a couple of years: the Hope Charity Sports Breakfast.

This was the first year in 25 years that we did not have an employment partnership with Red Nose to deliver the Baby and Child program. However, we were lucky enough to have the Geelong Community Foundation help us by providing 12 months' funding. This gave us the capacity to continue to deliver our services while planning for the future - and that's what we did. We have secured funding from Give Where You Live for the next financial year and remain committed to continue to run this much-needed program.

This year also saw us successful in gaining multi-year grants for the first time - three years from the Anthony Costa Foundation for the Kids Grieve Too program and two years from the Geelong Community Foundation to evolve the Hope model. Amazing! We can't thank them enough. Other grants have also assisted: The Freemasons Foundation Victoria not only continued to fund the Support After Suicide program but increased the funding to provide for a new initiative, which is now being implemented with the aim of improving access to bereavement support - such as developing models to better support bereaved men.

So, another extraordinary year - but then, I do work for an extraordinary organisation. Hope is one of those rare organisations that not only was born from the community but remains firmly located there.

Bereaved people in the Geelong community, receiving local services delivered by Geelong community members and supported by the Geelong community: It's the way Hope has always been and the way we remain committed to being.

I am supported by a Board of skilled and resourceful people, led by the incredible Bernie Jenner. The staff team that deliver all we do are passionate and committed people who feel honoured to do this work, and I thank each and every one of them.

The larger Hope community is also extraordinary; 38 years from the organisation's inception and they have again rose to the challenge of identifying need and providing support and funding.

We hope to be here in another 38 years, and we remain committed in supporting everyone who is bereaved - ensuring they are not alone in grief.

The History of Hope-

How we got here...

Community Need identified

Barwon Pediatric Bereavement Program was established in 1985 following concerns about the lack of regional services supporting families following the death of a child.

Dr Bernie Jenner and other concerned people formed a committee that fundraised and partnered with Barwon Health to employ our first counsellor. In 1992, Hope formed a working relationship, with the Sudden Infant Death Research Foundation, known today as Red Nose, which endured until 2020.

Hope is born

Hope Bereavement Care became an Incorporated Association in 1992 with Dr. Bernie Jenner becoming the first Chairperson, a position he still holds.

In 2004, Hope Bereavement Services adopted the trading name Hope Bereavement Care.

Hope continues to co-locate at Barwon Health but moved to the Kitchner House location.

Remembrance events are developed in response to articulated need including the Walk of Hope.

Sudden and Unexpected Deaths

After years of referrals from families who had an adult child die, as well as clients returning for additional support after subsequent deaths of their partner or parents, Hope expanded the service to include all sudden and unexpected deaths. After service mapping there appeared to be supports for individuals where a death was known.

Over the years Hope has formed many partnerships with Red Nose, Road Trauma Support Services, and Australian Centre for Grief and Bereavement in order to deliver local services to bereaved families.

2020

First Executive Officer Employed

Up until 2020, Hope was managed by Board members in voluntary roles. In 2020, partnerships were reducing or ceasing to commit to staff in regional area's so they could focus on Australia wide telephone supports. As a result Hope was at financial risk of ceasing services. The Hope Board made the decision to invest in an EO to review community needs, resources, service mapping and potential income streams.

2022

What we need...

Review of Service Gaps and community needs highlighted:

- Clients continue to want a range of supports after they are bereaved, from practical support to counselling.
- Hope has many elements of support that we do not articulate nor collect data on.
- The Hope model has evolved over time, based on community needs, but needs to continue to evolve so that it is both proactive and responsive to community demands.
- Hope needs to articulate its value in order to meet needs of donors and funders

Support After Suicide Program

A group of concerned people, (including now Board member Danny Keating), involved with and affected by suicide, identified a gap in the support of people bereaved by suicide. They worked with other organisations to develop a partnership model, resulting in the establishment of Hope Support After Suicide (SAS) delivered in partnership with Jesuit Social Services. Danny now sits on the Hope board. Referrals increase to 250 people per annum.

What we know...

- Bereavement 'falls through the gaps' within mental health and primary health services funding.
- There will always be a percentage of people requiring grief support ranging from information to counselling.
- Grief is unique to each person. Within a family, there are multiple needs for the family unit, extended family, and each individual member.
- Every death can affect multiple individuals and multiple communities
- The people who care for the bereaved often do not have the capacity or capability to support them.
- Services need to be available when the person needs
- Investing in grief matters. It reduces poor mental health outcomes, maintains community connections, and prevents suicides.

Our New Hope Model

AWARENESS RAISING AND ADVOCACY

- Communications about bereavement to reduce the stigma, particularly around pregnancy loss and suicide death
- Raise awareness of supports available particularly for underrepresented groups with poor mental health outcomes, such as First Nations people and men.

SPECIALIST PROGRAMS

BABY AND CHILD

Support to anyone grieving the death of a child, during pregnancy, birth and up to 18 years. Ww deliver the Treasured Babies Program, offering parents appropriately sized clothing, teddy bears and memory boxes.

SUPPORT AFTER SUICIDE


Support to anyone experiencing the loss of a loved one by suicide; and those in the wider community who may be caring for them. This service is delivered in partnership with Jesuit Social Services.

WHAT WE ACHIEVED

Hope, together with our partners, supported 541 people grieving the loss of a loved one. This included 1,471 counselling sessions for:

- 51 mer
- · 28 children in primary school, as well as 14 children at our Memory Mornings
- 173 people grieving after a suicide death and 82 people grieving after losing their baby during pregnancy or birth
- 172 parents grieving the loss of their child, 91 children grieving the death of a parent, 78 people grieving the death of their life partner and 39 grieving the death of their much-loved sibling

A YEAR WITH UNIQUE CHALLENGES

We started the year with lockdowns and have worked to maintain our services while adapting to changes in government guidelines, community need and how this unique time impacted our clients' bereavement journeys.

We have delivered services in new ways, and some old, including:

- · Face-to-face counselling
- · Home visits
- Walking and park sessions
- · Tele-counselling
- · Tele-groups
- Joining with our partners' tele-groups
- Creating more resources and updating our communication models

Despite the challenges, we strived to ensure that we were able to walk beside our clients in a helpful and supportive way throughout this time.

Baby and Child

PROGRAM

The Baby and Child program provides localised bereavement support to anyone grieving the death of a baby or child.

OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

- Responded to 97 new referrals and continued to support many more
- Provided individual, couple and family sessions and met with grandparents, siblings, aunts and uncles to provide guidance on supporting their loved ones and managing their own grief
- Delivered two virtual remembering events

 the Walk of Hope and Annual

 Remembering Service, to over 200 people
- 20 children who lost siblings came together to create art pieces to honour their brothers and sisters
- Delivered 20 support groups with an increase in groups offered, including the newly-added 'Bereavement in the Bar' targeted at fathers who have lost a child

Kids Grieve Too

PROGRAM

OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

Kids Grieve Too (KGT) provides grief support to children and young people experiencing the loss of a loved one, including bereavement by suicide, as well as family and professionals in the wider community who are caring for them. Bereavement support is provided through education, family support, counselling, groupwork and capacity building.

- KGT provided 147 counselling sessions and 97 brief interventions - an increase of 358 per cent from previous years
- 7 education sessions to parents as a response to a death in their community

HOPE VOLUNTEER

Lauren co-facilitated the After Suicide Loss Support Group and the Support After Suicide Peer Support Coffee Morning group. Lauren has a calm presence, wisdom and excellent communication skills. Hope is grateful to have Lauren involved and we believe she is a more-than-deserving winner.

LIFE AFTER LOSS

Together with Tuckers Funeral and Bereavement Service, Hope ran the Learning to Live with Loss (LTLWL) group, a four-week group for women who have experienced the death of a partner. Nine participants attended the group and formed an ongoing connection that endures to this day.

AMMOS LADIES DAY

Hope was lucky enough to be the chosen charity partner for the Geelong Ammos Ladies Day. Long-standing Board member Pam Virgona and lived-experience speaker Kim Edgar both spoke on the day, sharing the story of Hope and their personal experience of grief. The event was a great success and a whopping \$10,000 was raised for Hope! This was then increased to \$12,500. It was evident that the community spirit of the members in the room reflected the story of Hope - local people, a part of local clubs, supporting local services to ensure that local people are not alone in grief. Hope followed up with presenting safeTALK (suicide prevention training) to a group of volunteers across the club.

Kieron Hunter from Barry Plant Highton had an idea!
When the Systermans family, who are known for their
philanthropy, approached him to sell their home, he offered to
donate the commission back to a local charity in need. Brenton
Systermans contacted Hope to ask what we would do with the
funds. That was easy: Hope runs on a small budget and does not
receive any recurrent funding. Funds would be used to deliver our
programs to ensure that those grieving the death of a baby or
child, grieving after suicide or grieving any sudden and
unexpected death would not be alone in grief. As a result, Hope
was given the honour of being the selected charity.

On 14 May 2022, Kieron Hunter auctioned the property in Newtown, and as a result, \$27,500 of hard-earned commission was donated to Hope.

Hope extends our heartfelt thanks to Kieron, Barry Plant Real Estate, the Systermans family and the people who used our service and advised the family of the ongoing need for the Hope model. We are incredibly grateful for your support.

STAFF HIGHLIGHT: CHRISTINE RAWSON

Christine Rawson is a kind and compassionate human with an amazing capacity for empathy and good humour, whose calm nature provides a safe space for all in her presence. It is why the Hope team describe being so supported and "lucky" to work with her and why her clients describe feeling held by the service.

Christine has been a bereavement counsellor with Hope for 10 years, a position she describes as "not just a job, but a vocation". Her employment initially started as a partnership with Road Trauma Support Services Victoria (RTSSV) then another partnership with the Australian Centre for Grief and Bereavement (ACGB), before finally, in 2017, it transitioned to a standalone Hope role. Christine describes the milestone of 10 years "as a wonderful journey whilst working alongside so many who have been/are incredibly skilled, supportive but above all compassionate and so dedicated to their roles". Her role as a grief counsellor is one of a "constant sense of privilege" and being with people through an "enormously challenging time in a person's life (with) pain, hurt, fragility, anger, regret and vulnerability" where she constantly strives to be as effective a counsellor as possible, working to move towards "adjustment, acceptance and enduring love".

We didn't need to ask for comments about Christine's work. She is someone who inspires positive feedback, so we leave you with some comments from some of the people she has worked with:

- "Christine was so warm, friendly & compassionate, that we were soon at ease. Thanks to her and all the Hope Bereavement team, who provide an invaluable service to bereaved individuals & families."
- "... without Christine's support I don't know where I would be."

NOTE 2 - ACCUMULATED FUNDS

- (b) Funds held on behalf of Kids Grieve Too Program \$36,145
- (c) Funds held on behalf Of Baby and Child Program \$40,000
- (d) Funds needed for General Program \$55,000
- (e) Funds needed for administration \$20,000
- Balance of funds (shortfall) (\$158,500) that will need to be raised for the 2022-2023 financial year.
